### Tomfoolery: over the shoulder, into the future

s we enthusiastically enter the millennium here at the Berman Music Foundation, it is only natural to take stock. That means taking a look back over our shoulder at 1999 before we race ahead to what promises to be another eventful year in jazz.

Early last year, the BMF-funded exhibit "Drawing on the Beat: John Falter's Jazz Portraits" opened with a gala ceremony in March at the Museum of Nebraska History, where it remains on display until April 2000. If you haven't had a chance to see the late Nebraska artist's marvelous interpretations of jazz musicians at work and play, visit the museum at 15th and P streets in Lincoln.

The 17-piece Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks Orchestra proved that no one is truer to the legacy of Duke Ellington when the band performed an Ellington tribute in April at the Lied Center for Performing Arts in Lincoln.

The Memorial Day weekend in May provided another opportunity to bask in the bountiful music of the Topeka Jazz Festival, where the second annual event featured outstanding performances by dozens of topnotch, but rarely heard jazz players.

In June, the BMF entourage headed south again for the 4th Annual Kansas City International Jazz Festival. Norman Hedman's Tropique, the seven-piece Latin jazz combo that has recorded two CDs under the auspices of the Berman foundation, opened the festival with one of the most exciting sets of the weekend.

Closer to home, Lincoln's Jazz in June series held few surprises, but the July Jamm festival featured longtime BMF friend Kevin Mahogany on the main stage and some of Lincoln and Omaha's best jazz musicians on the more intimate indoor stage.

A four-day trip to New York City in August gave me a chance to witness Tropique in action in the studio, as the band "waxed" its second BMF-funded CD.

In October, saxophonist Bobby Watson and Horizon brought their very hip music to the Lied Center and conducted a workshop for University of Nebraska-Lincoln students, all with the financial support of the BMF.

Also in October, the foundation helped to fund the performance by pianist Jane Jarvis, bassist Earl May, and trombonist Benny Powell at a fundraiser for the Lincoln Seniors Foundation. October performances by the Seamus Blake Quartet and Burhan Ocal at the Johnny Carson Theater and by the Cuban group Irakere at the Lied Center capped a very busy month.

Meanwhile, the Nebraska Jazz Orchestra took its 24th annual concert series up the road to the venerable Pla-Mor ballroom, where fans can kick up their heels on the dance floor while they listen to some of the best swing and jazz music in the Midwest.

It looks like more of the same this year, and I'm not complaining. I'm looking forward to the usual festivals in Topeka and Kansas City, and the possibility of the addition of the Vail Jazz Festival later in the year. I wish you all equally good listening in 2000!












