She has performed with Louis Armstrong, Jimmy Rushing, Jack Teagarden, Turk Murphy, and Art Hodes...just to name a few. Staying with a fine acoustic sound. WHAT IS A JAZZ JAM?

Jazz jams have been in existence since the birth of jazz in1895, when Buddy Bolden started blowing his trumpet. A jazz jam is a place for musicians to gather and to work the music out, and to sharpen their chops...where young and old can meet...the experienced, and the inexperienced. A jazz jam is a learning and teaching ground. Norman Granz was responsible for arranging the first jam sessions that required an admission charge. These jam sessions took place at the Trouville Club every Sunday at 4:00 P.M. The Trouville Club was in L.A., California. In 1942, Norman Granz was a film editor for MGM. Of course, he went on to produce the Jazz At The Philharmonic Concerts and Verve Records.

The Berman Music Foundation sponsors a jazz jam every Wednesday night at Huey's. Huey's is located at 245 N. 13... in the lower level, and 1/2 block east of The Lied Center. Bring your instruments and your voices, and join in the fun. The jazz jams are led by Nancy Marshall and Butch Berman. We have been very pleased at the turn out. There have truly been some great moments. If any teachers would like to bring their students down to sit in, you are more than welcome. If you haven't checked it out, it's time. The place is Huey's every Wednesday night.

Huey's also brings you the sounds of the big band. Every Monday night, you'll find David Sharp leading Lincoln's finest musicians.
