It was also very pleasing to me to see the thousand plus crowd at Kimball for the marvelous KC Latin group...Musa Nova. Free admission or not, it certainly shows how jazz education in the schools can spark a mushrooming of activity that's very contagious and extremely healthy for our growing jazz community. THE TURTLE ISLAND STRING QUARTET

The Turtle Island String Quartet performed at The Lied Center for Performing Arts on Saturday, October 28. The "Turtles" included Darol Anger... playing violin and baritone violin, Tracy Silverman.. playing violin, Danny Seidenberg...playing viola and violin, and Mark Summer... playing cello. These players take the "string quartet" to new levels, and are always searching for ways to incorporate all types of music into their repertoire.

From watching the performance, it's clear to me that they have fun with their music, and like sharing the fun with their audiences. It's as if the members of the band talk to each other with their instruments. The words stuffy and stiff do not exist in their vocabularies. They encouraged laughter and audience participation. Being true masters of their instruments, they performed tunes by Weather Report, Miles Davis, and Dave Brubeck, and then went on to prove that their music has no boundaries by taking us from sophisticated chamber music to capturing the true psychedelic flavor of Jimi Hendrix...making me wonder if Jimi Hendrix was hovering somewhere above them.

One of my favorites was the Thelonious Monk composition called "Ruby, My Dear". These musicians are innovative and intelligent, using the art of improvisation to make sounds that made me see a person sneaking or tiptoeing across the floor, or sneaking up the stairs in the dark. They more than earned their standing ovation. BRAVO!

My only regret was that the Lied Center wasn't sold out.

ANGELA HAGENBACH and MUSA NOVA

Angela Hagenbach and Musa Nova performed at Kimball Recital Hall on Thursday, November 9, 1995...to a packed house. I heard that they had to turn 300 people away. That fact in itself gives me hope that the jazz scene can and will grow in Lincoln, Nebraska.

As the show began, Angela explained that "Musa Nova" means new inspiration in Portuguese, and then they were off into the pulsing "Latin" rhythms of their music. If you closed your eyes, you could feel the same high energy that must have propelled the "Original Mambo Kings". This band was tight.

Angela's warm voice captured the audience immediately. She has learned, and expresses the Portuguese language flawlessly. She knows how to use the range of her voice to her best advantage... and you wonder just how low can she go. She's beautiful, she's smart, she works hard, and she's real.

Joe Cartwright has a style all his own, and his classical background comes through. He is "On Fire" when he sits down to a piano, and he works the entire keyboard. There is great beauty and sensitivity in his work.

Danny Embrey writes haunting melodies... such as "Samba 88" and "Amazonas". His guitar work is melodic and hauntingly romantic. Danny's Latin background shines through, having spent several years touring with Sergio Mendes, and then three years with Clare Fischer's Latin band.

The percussion section included James Jeffley playing 5 and 6 string bass...I have trouble with 4 strings. James lends a strong pulse to the band. Doug Auwarter, the drummer, is a master of Brazilian rhythms. Doug is considered an authority, and he actually travels to Rio de Janeiro every year. Gary Helms added congas and percussion, completing the "Musa Nova" ensemble. The band played with an energy and intensity, as Angela painted beautiful pictures with the lyrics. Their performance earned them a standing ovation. BRAVO!

THE FIRST ANNUAL JANE JARVIS INVITATIONAL...

Jane Jarvis is a most amazing lady. I feel fortunate that I was able to travel to Tampa, Florida for this very important jazz festival. This festival was actually the very first jazz festival named in the honor of a woman. What an amazing fact, when you realize that jazz was born with Buddy Bolden in 1895...one hundred years ago...and many women have contributed and advanced its history.

I interviewed Jane Jarvis on my radio show on March 24, 1995. Jane is a warm, intelligent, and very dedicated jazz player. She just turned 80, and is putting down on record some of the best work of her life. Since the beginning of 1995, she has released 3 CD projects. Jane is also the only woman in the "Statesmen of Jazz", which happens to be one of the CD projects. Jane supports jazz education with her foundation...JAZZ MUSIC EDUCATION inc.

This Invitational commenced on Friday, November 2, 1995, and was an extremely inspirational event for me. The event was small and intimate, so that everyone met, talked, and spent time together. Fabulous musicians were invited to attend...Dick Hyman, Bob Haggart, Joe Wilder, Bucky Pizzarelli, Tommy Newsom, Grady Tate, Clark Terry, Bob Rosengarden, Bill Watrous, Tommy Newsom...just to name a few. I will admit that I was overwhelmed.

Pastor John Garcia Gensel from St. Peter's in New York City opened the ceremonies with, "We thank you for the gift of Jane Jarvis." The music began with Gershwin's "'S Wonderful". Grady Tate's plane was late, so Tracy Alexander, Mousie Alexander's son, started the evening. As Bill Watrous said later in the show, "Truly a chip off the old block." Tracy is intelligent, musical, and says as much with his silences while drumming, as he says with his beats...a very rare attribute. Joe Aaron, the clarinet player, came in from Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Jane and Joe hadn't played together for well over 30 years. Joe swings hard and has fun with his music. He can take you out of a song, as if he were the "Pied Piper". Joe Wilder, the trumpet player, definitely has his own sound...great phrasing and tone. Frank Tate, the bass player, looked as if he were dancing with his bass...smooth.

Grady Tate arrived, and instead of taking over on drums he decided to join in and sing "Body and Soul"...with deep emotion. Jane slipped in a little "Somewhere Over the Rainbow"...she just knows how to dance. This was only the beinning...the show was on, with many more magic moments.

Some of the highlights for me were...

Hearing Ed Polcer on cornet was a treat. He has such a clear sparkling tone.

Joe Temperly is such a soulful baritone and soprano saxophone player. His solo rendition of "In A Sentimental Mood" on baritone was breathtaking.

Michael Moore played his bass as if he and the bass were one...as if they were having an intense affair. Jane and Michael played a rousing version of "Caravan", as a jazz waltz.

Seeing and hearing Tommy Newsom play tenor sax was amazing. He injects so much humor when he plays, and is so natural. Tommy is a very versatile player. When he and Bucky Pizarelli played "Willow Weep For Me", the crowd was hushed...it was just a duo folks, and they didn't need any help.

Jane played a solo version of "Ive Got You Under My Skin" that stopped the show. The song was dedicated to Cole Porter's cousin, Mag Richardson, who was attending the festival.

I've never seen or heard a drummer inject humor into his music the way that Bob Rosengarden does. Several times during the festival, the whole audience burst into laughter, as he drummed.

On Saturday night, Clark Terry joined the festivities. What a player! One highlight was when Joe Temperly and Clark sang "Squeeze Me", in Clark's own mischievous style. What a duet!

Dick Hyman is just pure elegance! He has been one of my favorite pianists for years.

I have truly discovered the trombone in the last year. And Jane had three of the best taking part in her festival. Bill Watrous plays notes that don't even exist. Dan Barrett can play so sweetly, you feel as if you stepped into a dream. Bill Allred swings like

swing should be played. I was only sorry that Bill didn't sing...he has a marvelous voice.

Another treat was meeting and hearing the legendary bass player, Bob Haggart. He is a man who has set many standards during his career, and bass players today still strive for those standards.

Miss Barbara Baxter delivered a fine vocal rendition of "I Can't Give You Anything But Love."

John Bunch and Michael Moore performed a sensitive version of "Come Sunday." John is a very gentle and heartfelt piano player. A perfect combination with Michael's bowing. Then they were off "Stompin' At The Savoy", with Tracy Alexander joining them on drums.

The players presented a workshop to students on Saturday afternoon. Interestingly enough, the students that attended were girls. The players taking part in the workshop were Jane Jarvis, Ed Polcer, Bill Watrous, Grady Tate, Dan Barrett, Joe Aaron, and Michael. The workshop began with a jazzy version of "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star", with Jane leading. Each musician talked about their particular instrument, and demonstrated. They discussed the history of jazz, and as Joe Aaron said, "You can't know where you're going, until you know where you've been." Bill Watrous added that we should all remember that music is God's gift...a gift to be treasured. The four young ladies attending the workshop, were all presented with a Louis Armstrong CD. They were also given a CD of an artist of their particular instrument. The workshop was very inspirational for those attending.

I hope you enjoyed the highlights of The Jane Jarvis Invitational. Of course, there was so much more than just what I wrote about. If you can imagine 15 hours of "live music" in just 2 1/2 days...and a workshop. People attended from London, Venezuela, Norway, and from many states. I will look forward to attending again next year, and seeing the friends made.

The festival was kicked off in high fashion with a party on Thursday, November 2 at the home of Jerry and Jane Williams, which overlooks beautiful Tampa Bay. I would like to thank them for their warm hospitality. Jerry also happens to be a fine trumpet player.

Gresham Yeager has been instrumental in helping Jane put her foundation together, and is dedicated to jazz education. He is Jane's cousin, and actually has ties here in Lincoln. He graduated from the UNL School of Dentistry in the early 60s. His

daughter lives in Lincoln, and also attended the festival. Gresham and Bill and Jerry York put together one of the classiest affairs of the season, and it was an honor for me to have been included.

Jane Jarvis is a treasure, and as I said previously, she is putting down on record some of the best work of her career right now. If you have trouble finding Jane's CDs, please call me at my studio. She has released three CDs in 1995.
